Recollections from Canon Dick Nolan on the Founding of Integrity-Palm Beach

Bob and I had been attending Integrity Fort Lauderdale at All Saints Church for a while. On one of our journeys there from our West Palm home, I again spoke of my dislike of I-95 travel. As I concluded my complaint, a vehicle in front of us spun around and ended up in a ditch; no one was injured. At the post-Service supper, we met Herb Steer, John Lacy, and Vance Oden from St. Andrew's, Lake Worth; they were exploring the possibilities of an Integrity chapter. We jumped at the chance of a much closer chapter, one without any I-95 travel.

Integrity Fort Lauderdale was, by choice, an independent activity hosted as a courtesy by All Saints, similar to some other groups using parish facilities. During *our* planning, we chose instead to be a parish activity - a plan accepted by Fr. William Hamilton, who as rector had the responsibility of building usage. Wisely, the vestry was consulted by Fr. Hamilton, and some significant opposition was aired. A few parishioners, including some vestry members, eventually left the parish. Furthermore, as a courtesy Fr. Hamilton informed the Bishop about these plans.

As a parish activity, the St. Andrew's chapter flourished as a ministry integrated within the parish, a ministry that welcomed all persons. We wanted to make it clear from the outset, however, that as with all other parish activities, participants respected Christ's "Summary of the Law," that is, "*You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. The second is like it, you shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all other laws and the prophets.*" Integrity was not an amoral association, which was a fear or concern of some parishioners who left and some who remained.

During our preparations, the Board expressed the hope that administratively Integrity-Palm Beach would remain as uncomplicated as possible. None of us felt called to become a heavy-handed bureaucracy; we would have only those committees, etc. that were necessary for the fellowship to function. We saw our purposes initially as including corporate worship and fellowship (a supper and a 20 minute presentation on some timely topic). Participants were encouraged to serve via other parish activities, too. We intended sufficient flexibility that the chapter's purposes could be adjusted as it evolved.
