

# Rev. Nolan Receives Hartford Appointment

The Rev. Richard T. Nolan, instructor in religion and mathematics at the Cheshire Academy, Conn., has been appointed to posts at the Hartford Seminary Foundation and University of Connecticut.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas M. Nolan, Jr., of the Wilton Shores Apartments, NW 30th St., Ft. Lauderdale. Rev. Nolan assists at Christmas services in the Episcopal Church of the Intercession in Ft. Lauderdale while visiting with his family.

The minister has been appointed visiting lecturer in Philosophy and Education at Hartford Seminary Foundation, an inter-denominational institution preparing college graduates for vocations in research, education and church-related ministries.

As lecturer in philosophy at the University of Connecticut, Rev. Nolan will teach courses in logic, history and philosophy of religion, and basic philosophical issues. During the coming summer he will teach at the University's Waterbury Branch, and in the fall the Hartford Branch.

As these appointments were made, the Corpus Press of Washington, D. C., a Roman Catholic led affiliate of the World Publishing House, announced the pending publication of *The Order of Deacons: Sacred or Outdated?*, edited by Rev. Nolan.

A historical and theological study of the Christian Diaconate, an aspect of the Ministry, the book includes con-

tributions from notable Protestant, Orthodox, Anglican and Roman Catholic scholars from the United States, Germany, India and Ireland. The volume is scheduled to appear in the spring of 1968.

Assuming his position at The Cheshire Academy in the fall of 1965, the 29-year-old scholar had taught at The Watkinson School (Hartford),

The Cathedral School of The Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine (N. Y.), and summers at the University of Miami (Fla.) and Long Island University. He has also been a lecturer in philosophy at the Hartford Branch of the University of Connecticut and University of Hartford.

A graduate of Boston Latin School and Tabor Academy, Rev. Nolan earned a B. A. degree at Trinity College (Hartford) and B. D. at Hartford Seminary Foundation. He is a June candidate for the degree of Master of Arts in Religion at Yale University. A candidate for a Ph. D. at New York University, Nolan has also studied at Berkeley Divinity School (New Haven), Union Theological Seminary (N. Y.), and Connecticut Valley Hospital center of the Institute of Pastoral Care.

In 1964 Nolan was awarded a Scholar Incentive Award by the State of New York and a fellowship by the Department of Christian Education of the Episcopal Church's Executive Council, the New York headquarters of the Episcopal Church in the United States. The same year he was elected

to membership in Phi Delta Kappa, an honor society for men in education. He also holds memberships in the Religious Education Association, National Education Association, Connecticut Education Association, and American Association of University Professors.
